Historical Perspective

2018 marks 100 years since Poland regained independence after partitions conducted by Russia, Prussia and Austria, which erased Poland from the map of Europe.

Often debatable, the main causes leading to the three successive partitions in 1772, 1793 and 1795 were:

- Numerous wars that weakened the country
- The internal disunity of Poland
- The emergence of its neighbours;
 Russia, Austria and Prussia, as leading European powers.

The Napoleonic Wars (1797 – 1815), The November Uprising (1830 – 1831) and The January Uprising (1861 – 1865) are examples of Poland's drive to freedom.

During the period of 1833 to 1871, Polish revolutionaries participated in uprisings in-Prussia, Austrian Empire and Imperial Russia.

On 11 November 1918, Józef Piłsudski, leader of the clandestine Polish Military Organisation, returned to Warsaw from a German prison to become Chief of State, proclaiming the Second Polish Republic.
